Becoming ADA Compliant is Easy with MTI

Improve access to care for people with disabilities by getting ADA Compliant examination chairs in your medical and dental facilities.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services ("HHS") and the U.S. Department of Justice ("DOJ") issued final rulings, requiring medical and dental offices, clinics, emergency rooms, hospitals, and other healthcare settings, to comply with the 2017 U.S. Access Board's Standards for Accessible Medical Diagnostic Equipment (the "Standards"), such as your examination chairs.¹



Ensuring Compliance

Facilities receiving federal funding assistance (HHS). including payments from Medicare, Medicaid, and CHIP. and state and local governments (DOJ) must meet requirements by the dates to the right.

HHS Requirement

October 8, 2024

DOJ Requirement

Any examination chair acquired must meet the Standards until your regulatory requirements are met.

July 8, 2026

HHS Requirement

August 9, 2026

DOJ Requirement

Where an examination chair is used, each facility location must have 10-20% of your chairs, and at least one, that meet the Standards.

Do you qualify for an ADA tax credit?

To help implement these Standards, the IRS has issued Section 44 Disabled Access Credit (also known as the ADA Tax Credit), which may provide a tax credit of up to \$5,000 for ADA Compliant examination chairs.²
